<b>February 9</b>	Service Area Cookie Manager must submit all orders using the eBudde website

### Gift of Caring

## Troop Cookie Managers: Remember to schedule your troop's cookie booths!

### Cookie Cupboards

GSNWGL will arrange Cookie Cupboards throughout the jurisdiction. The Product Program Department will work with Cookie Cupboard Managers to determine how many cookies will be ordered and stored at each Cookie Cupboard.

Cookie Cupboards will store a variety of cookies that any troop may access to fill late orders and Goal Getter Orders. These cookies will also be available to sell at a Cookie Booth.

Cookie Cupboards will be available from March 7 to March 29, 2009.

When cookies are picked up by box or case from a Cookie Cupboard, the Cookie Cupboard Manager will transfer cookies to the receiving troop using eBudde. Cookies picked up from Cookie Cupboards may NOT be returned. However, cookies may be traded for another flavor. Troops are responsible for the cost of any cookies taken from the Cookie Cupboard and the amount will be included in the "Amount Owed to Council" on the Sales Report screen. Payment at pick up is NOT required. Troop Cookie Managers or her/his delegate must count, verify and sign for the cookies received from a Cookie Cupboard.

#### Tahquamenon Service Area

Tahquamenon Service Area has increased girl membership and is fast on the way to meeting their goal of a 5% increase this year! The area also saw a 100% retention of all troop leaders this year. They increased their number of registered adults when troops became so large that it was necessary to split the girls, creating three new troops for the area.

The success of the membership growth lies with the dedication of the area volunteers and the enthusiasm of the girls. Area event planning is shared by all troops and the girls have a variety of program opportunities to participate in. In an effort to reach out to new girls, the area manager, Melissa Coyne, will be working with the local middle school to bring the Cadette journey program to girls who may not be familiar with Girl Scouts. Along with regular troop meetings and area events, the girls participate in council programs whenever possible and are always ready to try new projects.

**Science, technology, engineering, and math – oh my!** Many leaders shy away from doing science related activities with their troops for a variety of reasons: they don't feel they have enough knowledge of STEM subjects and are unsure of how to teach others, the materials for experiments are not always readily available and are oftentimes expensive, and the meeting spaces troops use aren't always conducive to STEM related activities.

GSNWGL has taken away the stress of providing science programming to your troop! At *Science Spectacular!*, girls will participate in hands-on experiments, use the same equipment that scientists and engineers use, and put their thinking caps on to discover how they can use science to better their communities. Girls may choose to visit the planetarium to see the stars, mix up some crazy concoctions in the chemistry lab, or even learn the basics of aerodynamics by making their own kites!

So bring your troop to *Science Spectacular!* on April 4 and you will all be sure to have an educational experience you won't soon forget!

### Celebrate Girl Scout Week with your Troop!

#### **Girl Scout Birthday is March 12**

Girl Scout Birthday, March 12, commemorates the day in 1912 when Juliette Gordon Low officially registered the organization's first 18 girl members in Savannah, Georgia. Juliette's niece, Daisy Gordon, was the first girl registered in America.

#### **Girl Scout Week is March 8-14, 2009**

The week containing the Girl Scout birthday is known as Girl Scout Week. During this week, troops should make a special effort to celebrate Girl Scouting. The Saturday and Sunday of Girl Scout Week are designated as Girl Scout Sabbath and Girl Scout Sunday respectively. These days give girls an opportunity to attend their place of worship and be recognized as a Girl Scout. If a place of worship is the group sponsor, girls may perform a service, such as greeting, ushering, or doing a flag ceremony. These days can also be a time when girls explore other faiths.

- Put up a display about Girl Scouting in your local library.
- Make big, bright posters about how Girl Scouting helps girls discover, connect and take action in their community and then hang in schools and business storefronts.

### Summer Camp is Right Around the Corner

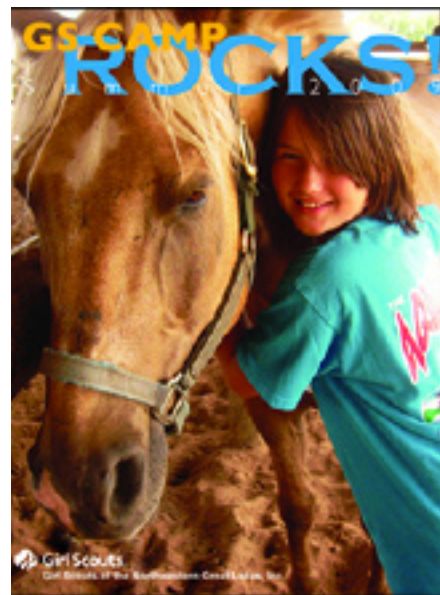
**GS Camp Rocks!, GSNWGL's 2009 Summer Program Guide, has arrived!**

### Portable Program Highlight

#### **Zink the Zebra**

February 14 may be Valentine's Day, but you don't have to wait until then to teach your troop to love diversity and embrace differences in others. The Zink the Zebra portable program is packed with activities designed to get girls thinking about the beauty of being different.



Zink the Zebra was created by a young girl named Kelly Weil. Kelly was different from many children at her school because she was battling cancer. Many of her friends did not understand what was happening to her, so they became distant and drew away. Kelly was so saddened by this that she wrote the story about Zink the Zebra, a zebra who is different on the outside, but still has feelings and emotions just like everyone else.

Zink the Zebra, who has spots instead of stripes, continues to tell Kelly's story today. With activities and discussion points created by the Zink the Zebra Foundation, Girl Scouts can receive Kelly's message of the importance of friendship, tolerance, and acceptance through our Zink the Zebra Portable Programs. There are kits for GS Daisies, Brownies, Juniors, and teens. Each girl in your troop will receive a Zink the Zebra stuffed animal as well as a Zink the Zebra patch to remind them of what they learned during the program.

### Camp Birch Trails

Rock Falls, WI

*Located in the Town of Rock Falls, about eight miles north of Merrill, WI this is our largest camp with 360 acres surrounding Lake Olivotti (a 35 acre man-made lake). The camp has three lodges, platform tents, cabins, yurts, large dining hall, a swimming area on the lake with a sandy beachfront and large dock, and a sledding hill for winter fun. Tents, outdoor cooking equipment, boats, canoes and kayaks are also available for use at the camp. During the winter months, cross-country ski trails are groomed, and a limited number of skis, snowshoes and sleds are available for use.*



<b>Graebel Lodge</b> <b>Capacity:</b> <b>Fee:</b> <b>Available:</b>	24/overnight \$45/day; \$60/overnight September - May	Jessica Lynn Graebel Memorial Lodge is a heated lodge. It features a fully equipped kitchen with toaster, coffee maker, dishwasher, refrigerator, freezer and microwave. There is a program room with tables and chairs, 2 separate bunkrooms, two separate washrooms with showers, a wood-burning fireplace, walk-out basement, washer & dryer in the basement and a large fire circle (with seating) at the site for outdoor cooking.
