

Super Troop

A patch program for troops or groups who are willing to take additional efforts to make Girl Scouting a more meaningful experience in their lives.

<p>Registration</p>	<p>All adult and girl members participating in troop activities must register</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Existing troops must re-register by September 30th • Newly formed troops must register within four weeks of organization
<p>Trainings</p>	<p>Leaders and Co-Leaders must complete the appropriate trainings</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Council 101 - for new leaders or those new to GSNWGL • Girl Scout Orientation - for new leaders • Leadership Essentials - for new and returning leaders
<p>Program</p>	<p>Complete five of your choice</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Hold a <i>Bring a Friend</i> meeting or event Have the girls plan and implement a program that they invite non-Girl Scouts to attend. • Hold two <i>ceremonies and invite parents to attend</i> Bridging, Investiture, Scout's Own, and a Court of Honor are a few examples. • Do a <i>Thinking Day</i> activity Visit www.girlscouts.org to view themes and get ideas. • Take one <i>Community Interest Field Trip</i> Examples include visiting the police department, museums and libraries, fire departments, or local points of interest. • Participate in one <i>Council-wide or Council-sponsored program</i> Visit www.gsnwgl.org or check <i>The Source</i> for programs available. • Complete a <i>Service Project</i> Ideas include making tie fleece blankets for a children's hospital, adopting a grandparent, planting flowers, or conducting a community clean-up day. • Have a <i>system of troop government</i> Troop kaper charts, Daisy Circle, Brownie Ring, and an Executive Board are a few examples.
<p>Journeys</p>	<p>Troops must work on Journey Book activities at no fewer than <i>three</i> regular Girl Scout meetings.</p>
<p>Council</p>	<p>Complete all of the following</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Do a <i>Camp Promotion</i> at one of your Girl Scout meetings Visit www.gsnwgl.org to download a camp brochure. You may choose to go through the brochure with your group, talk about all of GSNWGL's resident and day camps, invite a Council representative to your meeting, or even visit one of the camp properties with your troop. • Do a <i>Family Partnership presentation</i> at a meeting or event where parents are present Visit www.gsnwgl.org or contact your Membership Manager to learn more about the Family Partnership Campaign. • Have at least one adult represent your troop at 80% of all <i>Service Area Meetings</i> Contact your membership manager for dates and times. • Participate in both the <i>Fall Product Program</i> and the <i>Cookie Sale Program</i> Visit www.gsnwgl.org for dates of programs as well as for accompanying program materials. Newly formed troops organizing after the completion of the Fall Product Program may participate in only the Cookie Sale Program. • Design and create a <i>display about Girl Scouts and your troop</i> to post in your town Possible locations to post your display include local libraries, grocery stores, and museums. Remember to secure permission before posting anything. • Turn in <i>Leader Surveys</i> and <i>End of Year Treasury Reports</i> by June 30th.
